## Our Founding Story

In the summer of 1947, three FMDM Sisters left England for China. They had been commissioned to work with the Irish Friars Minor in their Franciscan Missionary outreach.

However, with the advancement of the Communist troops in China, the Sisters had to abandon their mission and go to Hong Kong instead, where they stayed with the Maryknoll Sisters.

At that time, they heard that Bishop Olçomendy of Malacca was looking for Sisters to care for tuberculosis patients in Singapore. This disease was both life-threatening and contagious during World War II.

On 7 March 1949, Sister Angela McBrien arrived in Singapore from Hong Kong, followed by Sisters Mary Camillus Walsh and Mary Baptista Hennessy. They took over the tuberculosis wards at Tan Tock Seng Hospital, which eventually became known as Mandalay Road Hospital. They also served the "Lepers Camp", a community of lepers housed in Trafalgar Home at Woodbridge. Both centres were managed as self-contained units as isolation was deemed the best treatment at that time.











In 1952, the Sisters were given an opportunity to start a private hospital to bring nursing care and services to the population. Thus, the FMDM Sisters began canvassing for donations. In addition to pooling their savings and salaries, many generous individuals and companies responded to the call to donate.

On 4 March 1961, the hospital was officially opened with 60 beds. The Sisters who staffed the hospital were professionally trained as nurses, midwives, physiotherapists, radiographers, laboratory technicians and other support services.



The hospital takes its name from La Verna, the mountain in Italy where St Francis of Assisi was believed to have received the Stigmata (an imprint of the five wounds of Christ). He led a life of radical simplicity and joy, sharing God's love for all people and all creation by loving and honouring every person he met, from lepers to sultans and popes to the ordinary townspeople.

Mount Alvernia Hospital today reflects the wisdom and inspiration of our founding Sisters and those who contributed to our organisation.

The hospital remains wholly owned by the FMDM congregation. The leadership team in the United Kingdom ensures that our hospital is compliant with governance guidelines and exercises responsible stewardship.

### Our Ethos

Mount Alvernia Hospital is a mission of faith, hope and courage to bring life and light into the lives of people and the community. The work by the FMDM Sisters in 1961 to care for lepers and tuberculosis patients is a call to love all, especially the marginalised and the poor.

At the heart of the Franciscan spirit is a joy that comes from an appreciation for life. This gives rise to a deep commitment to relationships with people and all creation – to be life-giving, all-inclusive and just.

The sacredness of life, the dignity of each individual and the community compel us to live out our values in our work – providing holistic healthcare and raising the quality of care and support for people where needed.

We believe in proactive collaborations and mutual support, partnering with doctors and other healthcare organisations to bring about charity and social service that empower sustained growth in healthcare. This enables us to

appropriately respond to the needs of an ageing population whilst continuing to deliver new life as a hospital reputed for maternity care.

We are a 304-bed general acute care health institution with tertiary medical capabilities and multidisciplinary specialist centres. The hospital is supported by over 1,200 accredited doctors with more than 200 specialists located on campus.

As a not-for-profit hospital, Mount Alvernia Hospital channels our surpluses to the communities we serve. Significant efforts are made towards providing outreach healthcare services to the underserved in the community.

The hospital is part of the FMDM global network spanning Singapore, Malaysia, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Italy, Australia, Nigeria, Southern Africa – reaching out to the sick, the poor and the marginalised through healthcare, pastoral care, counselling, education, as well as prison and parish ministries.

# Message from Sister Jane Bertelsen

Congregational Leader, FMDM

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As I look back at 2021, Mount Alvernia Hospital's Diamond Jubilee Year, I find myself wondering what our early sisters who worked so selflessly and tirelessly back in the late 50's and early 60's to build and establish Mount Alvernia would think as they look at what we see now. Some of those early pioneers are still with us; many are now interceding for us from their eternal home. These reflections are based on myself sitting down with these early sisters and reminiscing, observing the present and envisaging the future. I imagine they would look with wonder at the new buildings; they would marvel at the technology; they would give thanks to God for the many ways the hospital reaches out to the more vulnerable and marginalised in the community and they would look back with a smile to see how their hard work, fund-raising, blind faith and risk taking had borne such fruit.

However, I think there is another aspect of these pioneering sisters' reflection which would be more of a surprise to them. In those early days we always imagined there would be FMDM sisters to manage and run Mount Alvernia Hospital. We were not alone in this vision; every religious congregation thought the same – the 50's and

60's were 'boom' times for religious congregations across the globe. However, God's plan was different and, as ever, exciting and ever-new! The surprise, which fills both our pioneers and our current FMDM global family with joy and deep gratitude, is seeing our FMDM spirit and charism lived so fully in our lay Mission Partners across the entire hospital community – our Hospital Board, Executive Team, Heads of Department, every single member of staff all of whom mirror and reflect all that compelled our early sisters to do what they did. This is summed up in Mount Alvernia's motto to "Serve All with Love" and spelt out in their values of Compassion, Humility, Integrity, Respect, Peace - CHIRP for short! As vocations to religious life tail off (certainly in the developed world) we are confidently letting go and handing over to a whole generation of women and men committed to bringing the healing ministry of Jesus in the Franciscan way to all our patients and their families.

In the last two years this same Franciscan Missionary spirit has been powerfully reflected in Mount Alvernia's ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The working partnership with the Ministry of Health, the balance between pastoral, compassionate care and the demands of COVID regulations and restrictions, the generosity and selfless service of so many of our staff community has been a light shining in our FMDM hearts. We can no longer do what our Mount Alvernia team does but we can support them with our prayers. We also give thanks that God's original dream for Catholic healthcare in Singapore lives on in ways we could never imagine.

On behalf of all FMDM sisters across the globe we ask God's blessing on Mount Alvernia Hospital that it will continue to deepen, strengthen and expand its mission to serve the people of Singapore and we echo St Francis of Assisi's last words, "I have done what is mine to do; may Christ teach you what is yours."

# Message from Mr Ho Tian Yee

Amidst all this, I am heartened and applaud the Mount Alvernia Hospital team for their resilience - both rookies and veterans, locals and foreigners alike. What they went through personally and professionally could not have been easy, yet they did not give up and persevered to 'Serve all With Love'. In a year dominated by discouraging news, the whole team soldiered on.

We celebrated our 60th anniversary in the midst of the pandemic. As bleak as things may look, our founding Sisters could not have had it any easier when they first arrived in Singapore in 1949. Yet what they had was the courage and faith to respond to their vocation, and a calling to bring God's love and healing to all who were in need. They served those whom society had shunned, first the patients at Mandalay Road, and then those at Woodbridge, and the rest, as they say, is history. Fast forward to today, with COVID-19, the stage may have changed, healthcare services may have evolved, but it still requires the same courage and the same faith to respond to the calling.

Our hope for a grand 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration was curtailed but the team still managed to celebrate it in a memorable way via various pre-recorded and live streaming segments on 4<sup>th</sup> March, amongst other events held throughout the year. One notable contribution was the fundraising events organised in conjunction with our 60th anniversary. Our Community Outreach team took the lead to raise funds for three beneficiaries – Care Corner, Fei Yue and Montfort Care for specific programmes targeted at transnational families and child protection. A total of \$130,758 was raised from these two events.

Amidst all this, I am heartened and applaud the Mount Alvernia Hospital team for their resilience – both rookies and veterans, locals and foreigners alike. What they went through personally and professionally could not have been easy, yet they did not give up and persevered to 'Serve all With Love'. In a year dominated by discouraging news, the whole team soldiered on. When we converted two wards into COVID wards – the ward team were given the option to transfer to other non-COVID wards on but they chose to stay on.

The border closures and travel restrictions delayed the construction of our new mother and child centre and the integrated oncology services centre. Thankfully, the governments of Singapore and Malaysia announced a Vaccinated Travel Lane through the Johor–Singapore Causeway from 29 November 2021. The partial lifting of travel restrictions between Singapore and Johor Bahru (JB) was definitely met with relief and tears of joy, especially for our staff from JB who had been living in Singapore for the past two years and had not seen their families face-to-face; and also the development team as construction of our new centres can now be brought up to speed.

To quote best-selling author John Maxwell – 'Everything rises and falls on leadership' – I would like to commend the leadership team led by James for their skillful steering of the Mount Alvernia family during this pandemic. As the hospital expands and grows, my only hope is for it to replicate its values and DNA such that we can impact more lives and Serve All with Love.

# Message from Dr James Lam Kian Ming

2021 was a significant year in our history as we celebrated our diamond jubilee in the midst of fighting the COVID pandemic. We have come a long way from a 60-bedder hospital known for its maternity and paediatric expertise, into a 304-bedded multi-disciplinary general hospital to serve the changing healthcare needs of the community over the years.

The hospital was first opened by the Franciscan Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood (FMDM) Sisters in 1961. As we look back at the last 60 years, we are constantly in awe of the Sisters' vision, resilience, tenacity and hard work to build and develop the hospital. Their vision to continue with the healing ministry of Jesus Christ propelled them to build a private hospital at a time where there were none in existence - a hospital to meet the pressing needs of the population then. The Assisi Hospice was also birthed forth by the Sisters in 1969 for chronically-ill patients in one of our new wings.

We hope to carry on their vision and legacy with hospital developments like the new maternity and paediatric centre and an integrated oncology services centre. We believe that these developments will further define and shape our services to meet the ever-evolving medical needs of the population.

While we would very much want to celebrate in a big way, we were hemmed in by the COVID-19 safe management measures and restrictions. Despite this, we were very thankful to be able to hold our event virtually on 4 March with a hybrid of 'live' events and pre-recorded segments. We also had the honour of the Archbishop of Singapore and the Minister for Health who pre-recorded their well-wishes. There were close to 300 guests who tuned in to the celebrations.

Our FMDM Sisters, Sr Bernadette and Sr Florence also celebrated the diamond jubilees of their consecrated lives in ministry. Sr Bernadette was the recipient of the Healthcare Humanity Awards Honourable Mention Medallion for her contributions to the healthcare industry in 2015. The award honours individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the Singapore healthcare industry. Meanwhile, Sr Florence was the Hospital

Administrator from 1980 to 1983. In today's terms, that's equivalent to being a CEO. Sr Florence had the foresight to bring in lay people to help run the hospital.

Another significant milestone as we celebrated our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, was the opening of the Mount Alvernia Outreach Dental Clinic in Enabling Village at Redhill. This continued our founders' legacy of reaching out to our community, especially the underprivileged and underserved.

Aimed at making dental care easily accessible to all, our new clinic has a highly subsidised fee structure and inclusive environment. It is wheelchair accessible with wide open spaces, a low counter, sliding doors, and a wheelchair tilter for dental works. The whole place was designed to accommodate the needs of both Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) and their caregivers who may find other dental clinics difficult to navigate.

During the Heightened Alert phase, our nurses and frontline colleagues worked tirelessly to keep our hospital wards and the grounds safe. Their dedication never ceases to amaze me. During that period and even till today, they have taken on additional duties and responded swiftly to changing safety requirements such as donning protective masks, manning swab stations, and performing rostered routine testing for patients and their caregivers.

To my colleagues who have taken up backend support roles, thank you for going beyond the call of duty to tend to everyone entrusted in our care. I know many of you have family members and loved ones back in your hometowns, whom you must miss dearly, yet you continue to put on brave faces and perform your duties at Mount Alvernia Hospital with the utmost professionalism.

While the hospital continues to grow in both capabilities and capacities, the Mount Alvernia Hospital family will always aim to live our core principles and values – To Serve All with Love.

He is the first in Singapore to perform laparoscopic radical prostatectomy (2002), laparoscopic retroperitoneal radical nephrectomy, laparoscopic transposition of retrocaval ureter, laparoscopic repair of vesicovaginal fistula and robotic ureteric re-implantation.

Prior to entering private practice, Dr Lee was a senior consultant urologist and director of Endourology at TTSH, where he pioneered day surgery mini-Percutaneous Nephrolithotomy, and spearheaded several interdepartmental collaborations on the management of peritoneal dialysis access, shockwave lithotripsy for pancreatic ductal stones and surgical management of adrenal conditions. He was previously programme director for NHG Urology and Surgery-in-General residency programmess, and principal lead for Urology with the LKC School of Medicine.

Dr Lee currently serves on the Singapore Medical Council Complaints Committee and as Exco member of the Singapore Medical Association. He is visiting consultant to Dover Park Hospice, Ng Teng Fong General, and Khoo Teck Puat Hospitals.

Dr Liew's clinical expertise involves the screening, prevention and treatment of urological problems for various age groups. Treatments include open and laparoscopic (keyhole) surgery of the urinary tract system and male reproductive system, and male ageing treatment. Dr Liew has also performed various laparoscopic urological surgeries, such as laparoscopic prostate, kidney, bladder and ureter surgery.

Dr Liew was a clinical fellow at the St James's University Hospital, Leeds, UK, where he trained in the fields of endourology (minimally invasive treatment of kidney stones) and laparoscopy under the mentorship of Dr Adrian Joyce. Dr Liew then underwent robotic surgery training in 2006 and gained experience in robotic-assisted prostate surgery using the da Vinci robot.

Additionally, he is a kidney transplant surgeon and a member of the national kidney transplant team under MOH, Singapore.

Dr Lie graduated from Queens' College in Cambridge University with triple First Class Honours and subsequent degrees in Medicine and Surgery. He received his surgical degree from the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in 2006 and MMed (Surgery) in 2007. He then received urology training in SGH and NUH, and was elected a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow.

Dr Lie was a pioneer urologist at the Ng Teng Fong General Hospital (NTFGH), and was pivotal in obtaining one of the first high powered laser platforms in Singapore, improving stone and benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) care for patients. He also pioneered the use of HoLEP (Holmium Laser Enucleation of the Prostate) for BPH in Singapore.



Dr Ronny Tan Ban Wei Specialist Urologist and Andrologist Advanced Urology

Dr Tan is trained locally and board-certified by the Specialist Accreditation Board. He is the first Singaporean to be fellowship-trained in US in this niche specialty. He is a member of the RCSEd and a Fellow of the Academy of Medicine, Singapore.

Dr Tan was one of the first to implant the latest Titan Touch penile implant as well as the quadratic urethral sling. He pioneered the use of UroLift<sup>TM</sup> (Prostatic Urethral Lift) in Singapore. He is also appointed as UroLift<sup>TM</sup> Faculty to proctor surgeons learning the technique.

Additionally, he was one of the first to start using intralesional collagenase injections for the treatment of Peyronie's disease and reported on the efficacy of the second generation PDE5 inhibitor avanafil for treatment of erectile dysfunction.



Dr Shirley Bang Shieh Ling Urologist Advanced Urology

Dr Bang performs general and oncological urological procedures. These include endoscopic surgery for stone diseases, minimally invasive surgery (MIS) for urological cancers and treatment of benign prostatic conditions. She did her subspecialty fellowship in three hospitals, namely the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, Birmingham Women's Hospital and Russells Hall Hospital in UK.

During her time in TTSH, she ran a busy tertiary practice and managed both simple and complex urological cases on a daily basis. She is one of only two urologists who ran a weekly urodynamics and video urodynamics session in the hospital. She was instrumental in introducing Percutaneous Tibial Nerve Stimulation (PTNS) to the hospital in 2018.

Dr Bang sits on the executive committee of the Singapore Society for Continence. She has also authored research papers published in respected urological journals.



Dr Tan Teck Wei Senior Urologist Urohealth Medical Clinic

Dr Tan is a UK fellowship-trained senior urologist. He sits on the executive committee of the Singapore Urological Association and is a board member of the Chapter of Urologists in the College of Surgeons, Singapore.

He was formerly a consultant urologist and director of Genitourinary Oncology at TTSH, where he specialised in the management of complex urological cancers including that of the prostate, bladder, kidney and testis.

As an expert in the field of MRI-targeted prostate biopsies, he is an advisor to MOH's Agency for Care Effectiveness, which has successfully obtained approval for this type of biopsy to be the standard of care for the evaluation of men suspected of having prostate cancer in Singapore.

### Governance

Governance and leadership structures are in place to guide us in providing quality services as well as exercising responsible stewardship, accountability and controls.

The Board members are appointed by the Trustees of the hospital, acting on behalf of the FMDM Congregation, for a term of three years. The appointment is renewable for up to two terms.

The Board provides oversight in the following areas:

- Approval of broad policies, strategies and objectives for the hospital
- Corporate & clinical governance
- Monitoring of management performance
- Approval of annual budgets
- Overseeing the processes for evaluating the adequacy of internal controls, financial reporting and compliance and clinical system design improvements

To assist in the execution of its responsibilities, the Board has established eight committees, namely:

- Audit & Risk Management Committee (ARMC)
- Ethics Committee (EC)
- Finance Committee (FC)
- Hospital Development Committee (HDC)
- Medical Advisory Board (MAB)
- Nomination & Remuneration Committee (NRC)
- Technology Strategy Committee (TSC)

The MAB is elected by medical specialists and appointed by the Board to provide oversight of clinical governance matters. The Chairman of the MAB is also a member of the Board.

#### Our Healthcare System Framework

This report provides an overview of the health services and community outreach initiatives launched by the hospital in 2021. Beyond our commitment to deliver high quality patient care and improve clinical standards, we endeavour to be a good corporate citizen, going beyond the general expectation of a private healthcare service provider. 









# Reflecting 60 Years of Care and Service to All

We celebrated our anniversary on 4 March. Stroll down memory lane with us as we trace the FMDM Sisters' journey of building Mount Alvernia Hospital over the last 60 years.

#### 2016-2017

The Laboratory Services were redeveloped and expanded to provide increased capabilities and procedures based on the most contemporary medical laboratory methodologies and systems.



Our second outreach clinic comprising medical and dental services opened at Agape Village in Toa Payoh.

Successful transition from ISO 2008 standards to ISO 2015 standards hospital-wide.

#### 2015

The opening of St Dominic medical and surgical ward and St Michael maternity ward provided additional bed capacity to reduce waiting time and increased inpatient admissions.



We officially opened our first outreach medical clinic at the Enabling Village located at Redhill to provide healthcare services to people with disability, the elderly and financially needy residents.

#### 2014

Mr Gan Kim Yong, Minister for Health and Archbishop William Goh, officially opened Medical Centre D. The number of on-campus specialist clinics was increased to 89.



#### 2018-2019

Our Alvernia Endoscopy Centre was redesigned into a one-stop service facility with a minor operating theatre so that patients could undergo



colonoscopy and follow-up with other minor surgeries, if needed within the same premises.

Our electronic medical records system, christened HealthAngel went 'live'! HealthAngel would enhance hospital operations and be integrated into the national healthcare network.

#### 2019

We were the first private hospital to partner Community Chest to raise awareness and rally support for the Rare Disease Fund.

We announced our partnership with Icon Cancer Centre to build a new integrated cancer facility at the hospital premises, offering services like haematology and radiation oncology.

Our partnership with Prudential allowed patients to enjoy the convenience of cashless medical service.

A new wing was added to St Francis Ward with two sets of two-bedders and four-bedders, bringing our bed count to 304.

We began construction of a new maternity and paediatrics centre. The centre would be ready in 2022/2023.

#### 1961

On 4 March, Mount Alvernia Hospital started as a 60-bed hospital entirely staffed by the FMDM Sisters who were trained nurses. The first baby was delivered at the hospital on 12 March 1961.



#### 1965-1971

The late Mr Lee Kuan Yew officially opened a new five-storey wing, which brought the total number of hospital beds to 127.



By 1971, three extensions of the building had been added and were officially opened by the late Mr Lee Kuan Yew.

#### 1985

The Clinical Pastoral Care Department was established as part of holistic care to support patients and their relatives.



#### 1996-1997

Medical Centre A was opened, adding medical suites, operating theatres, delivery suites, an endoscopy centre and rehabilitation centre to the hospital.

More medical suites were added with the completion of Medical Centre B.

The total number of licensed beds was increased to 303.

#### 2013

Emeritus Archbishop Nicholas Chia officially opened our newly renovated Chapel.



We became the first hospital in Singapore to expand our magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) services for prostate, breast and magnetic resonance angiography (MRA) with the new 3 Tesla MRI digital scanner with Ambient Experience.

#### 2011

Launched the Mammography Screening Centre.

Officially opened our first overseas office, Mount Alvernia Hospital Information Centre (MAHIC), in Jakarta on 6 May.

#### 2009-2010

A hospital-wide community outreach programme was officially launched to bring health screening services to the poor and needy.

Launched and opened Alvernia Parentcraft Centre, a dedicated one-stop centre for antenatal care, childbirth education and newborn care.



#### 2004

The Day Surgery Centre and the 24-hour Walk-in Clinic and Emergency Services were opened and ready to serve the public.



#### 2020

Together as one Mount Alvernia Hospital family, we battle the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

On 3 November 2020, we hosted the groundbreaking ceremony for the Integrated Oncology Services Centre (IOSC),



a partnership between Icon Cancer Centre and Mount Alvernia Hospital, which is due to open in 2022.

#### 2021

We celebrate our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary with a series of virtual events and live events with safe distancing measures put in place.

A new dental clinic with wheelchair friendly features and catering to Persons with Special Needs opens at Enabling Village.

Inspired by its precision, reduced complications, and faster recovery for patients, we branched into robotic-assisted surgery using the da Vinci System.

## Community Outreach

#### Annual Flu Vaccination Exercise

Flu vaccinations were provided to residents of our disability homes and seniors home outreach partners. Given that it is logistically challenging for disability homes without resident physicians to administer this, and vaccinations are not fully subsidised, MAH has stepped in to provide for our outreach partners.

This year's vaccination exercise was held at Singapore Cheshire Home, Bishan Home for the Intellectually Disabled and Pertapis Senior Citizens Fellowship Home, on 8, 13 and 20 December respectively. A total of 186 residents and 39 staff were successfully vaccinated.

A big thank you to the Mount Alvernia team, including our locum doctors and volunteer MAH nurses, for keeping our elderly safe and healthy.



#### Maternity Support for Transnational Families

Pregnancy can be a stressful time for vulnerable families, especially when it happens during a period of retrenchment, imprisonment, spousal abuse or an unwed pregnancy. This outreach project supports vulnerable transnational families facing unexpected social and financial issues in their maternity journey. In particular, foreign wives married to Singaporean husbands who are on short or long-term visit passes, or are not eligible for government subsidies for hospitalisation.

In 2021, we journeyed with 5 mothers and their families: 4 transnational mothers and a young single unwed mother. The team in charge worked with social workers to provide emotional and pro-bono medical support for these mothers, through the course of their pregnancy and delivery; for example, through home visits, arranging gynaecology appointments and postpartum follow-ups.

#### Medical Support for Foreign Spouses and Workers

Foreign workers in Singapore whose healthcare needs are not covered by their employers are often hesitant to seek treatment, being unable to afford the medical costs. Their untreated condition adversely affects their quality of life and even their ability to work and support their family.

As such, Mount Alvernia Hospital seeks to support such workers – as well as foreign spouses – who can't afford medical treatment. The hospital will assist in providing a diagnosis of their condition through the required laboratory or diagnostic imagery support, as well as consultations with specialists. If treatment is straightforward, follow-ups may be provided.

This year's project saw a co-payment framework with HealthServe. In 2021, a total of 5 cases were treated.

#### Second Outreach Dental Clinic at Enabling Village

Our second outreach dental clinic officially opened at Enabling Village on 19 August 2021. The opening ceremony was graced by the Parliamentary Secretary for the Ministry of Social and Family Development & Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth, Mr Eric Chua.

Designed with an inclusive environment in mind, the new clinic caters to Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), including wheelchair users, people with special needs and their caregivers. Manoeuvring within the clinic is made friendlier through the installation of sliding doors, large entrances, a low counter and a wheelchair tilter for dental works.



Mount Alvernia Hospital also announced a new initiative to provide exclusive appointment times to PWDs and their caregivers referred by CaringSG, enabling them to have their dental needs jointly attended to in private. And in celebration of the hospital's 60th anniversary, the clinic offered complimentary scaling and polishing treatments to 60 PWDs and their accompanying caregivers referred by CaringSG.

#### MAH 'NIU' Year Blessings and Gift of Hope

In 2021, Mount Alvernia held two fundraiser campaigns as part of its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations. The first was NIU' Year Blessings, an online campaign via Giving.sg from 1 February to 28 February 2021. The second was Gift of Hope, another online campaign via Community Chest. This was conducted from 19 November to 18 December 2021.

Three charities were adopted for the year, with funds channelled equally to them. These included Care Corner, Fei Yue and Montfort Care. Funds raised went toward Early Risk Marriage Support Programmes by Care Corner & Fei Yue, targeted at transnational and early marriages couples, and also to Big Love by Montfort Care, which seeks to help families with child protection concerns improve their functioning and build resilience.



In total, \$130,758 was raised from both online campaigns. We thank all our generous donors for their kind contributions!

Process Excellence Customer Satisfaction People Development Financial Stewardship Officially unveiled during our Quality Day on 6 December 2021, the Pathway of Innovative Improvement (PII) serves as a common framework for all Quality Improvement and Innovation initiatives in MAH, providing a simple and logical yet comprehensive approach to guide such initiatives.

While MAH had embarked on various quality initiatives in the past, many of them utilised a variety of approaches and presentation methodologies. A common framework was needed to guide projects. As such, the PII was conceptualised in mid-2021 by our Centre for Quality, Informatics and Innovation (CQII) department, after poring through research articles and other similar frameworks. Aligned to MAH's strategic thrusts, the PII encompasses five key components: Practicing Empathy, Proactive Brainstorming, Prioritise, Prototype and Production.

In our push to enhance the quality of care provided to patients, the PII has proven to be indispensable when newly-trained quality innovators embarked on their QI journeys. Some have already shown encouraging signs of improvement in terms of operational excellence (e.g. reduced errors in staff claims), service quality (e.g. reduced dropped calls) or increasing productivity in areas like COVID patient transfers.

#### **Quality Innovators Training**

In line with our push to build a culture of continuous quality improvement at Mount Alvernia Hospital, the Quality Innovators training began in the 3rd quarter of 2021. Nominated staff from various departments underwent a series of six virtual lessons and six tutorials taught by our inhouse quality resource management trainer, Jermain Chng. Jermain collaborated with Dr Yin Shanqing, Assistant Director, Department of Human Factors & Systems Design, KKH, to co-develop training materials.

Through the training programme, staff became more knowledgeable in QI and project management, enabling them to become better quality innovators. As of January 2022, 7 participants from Group 1 (comprising various departments) and eight participants from Group 0 (comprising CQII staff) completed the training. The Group 1 participants then went on to lead QI initiatives within their departments, with the CQII staff as co-facilitators. Another four groups comprising 32 participants are planned for 2022.

#### Patient Safety Leadership Walkabout

Leadership walkabouts have proven to be effective in demonstrating leadership commitment and willingness to 'walk the ground' to understand staff concerns and co-develop solutions to these concerns.





At Mount Alvernia Hospital, our monthly Patient Safety Leadership Walkabout (PSLW) is another extension of the push to build a QI culture, and serves as a two-way communication platform for various departments' quality innovators to present their initiatives to senior management. Also, for our senior management to show support, give guidance and remove roadblocks.



As of January 2022, 3 PSLWs have been conducted. The PSLWs in 2021 were conducted virtually, while 2022's PSLW was conducted in hybrid with a physical visit by senior management. Nursing Administration, Clinical Administration, Facilities Management, Business Office, Finance, and Security departments hosted the PSLWs, with CQII providing secretariat support. Exciting quality initiatives were showcased by the departments, and the support provided by senior management resulted in renewed enthusiasm for the quality innovators to continue their improvement journey.





#### Transformation of Inpatient Meal Process


In our efforts to boost productivity, we sought to transform the food plating process for inpatient meals, with a systematic methodology to identify and eliminate waste.

Previously, 10 staff from the Main Kitchen were required to carry out plating, with multiple cross paths lowering productivity.

A series of engagement sessions were held with the F&B team in 2021, to brainstorm and generate ideas for the new process. The result was a conversion of the Main Kitchen's work table into a mimic conveyor belt plating

system. Each staff would have a different role as well, such as distributing the food and ensuring the correct meal was placed at each bed.

The new streamlined process was implemented on 28 June 2021, and saw great success. Staff were able to focus on their own role, eliminating cross paths during meal plating. Meal errors were also reduced, as all plated meals are checked by a staff before being placed into the meal trolley for heating up. There was also less manpower deployment, with the number of staff reduced by an impressive 30%.




#### Digitalisation of Porter Task Management

Before our Front Office embarked on this improvement project, Porter Task Management was recorded in a traditional method – using pen and notebooks. With records being handwritten, legibility varied and it was sometimes challenging to decipher what was being written. This made it impossible to fully replicate the handwritten data accurately onto a spreadsheet, to perform meaningful data analysis.

In light of this, digitising our Porter Task Management eliminated the use of paper, improved the clarity of imputed information and made data mining easy to generate reports and perform data analysis. Digitisation also encouraged staff to embrace technology.





## Developments in Nursing

#### Acquisition of New Robotic-Assisted Surgery System



A significant milestone in our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary was the adoption of a robotic-assisted surgery system at our Operating Theatre (OT). The precision of the incisions reduced complications and provided shortened recovery time for patients.

The 4<sup>th</sup> generation Da Vinci Xi robot facilitates surgery using a minimally invasive approach, and is controlled by specialist surgeons from a console. As of February 2022, our specialist surgeons and nurses have already performed up to 98 successful surgeries.

#### Training Nurses to Use the New Technology

The acquisition of new equipment meant training our nurses to assist doctors in robotic-assisted surgeries. A team of OT nurses was selected to lead and conduct train-the-trainer training to these other OT nurses. This training would be ongoing to meet the growing demand of these robotic surgeries.

In addition, our colleagues from Central Sterile Supply Department (CSSD) were also roped in for the sterilisation and disinfection of robotics equipment.

#### Training for New Paediatric Oncology Service

As we wait excitedly for the completion of our integrated oncology services centre, our paediatric ward nurses embarked onto learning and training from the oncology paediatrics trained experts to acquire this specialised knowledge and skills to deliver safe and competent care to children with cancer.

Work and operational processes were streamlined with the cancer team to ensure a smooth and seamless patient journey.



#### Advanced Skills Competency Assessment

To reduce patient's wait time to receive treatment, a list of advanced nursing skills was drawn up for staff nurses to be proficient and competent in. The nurse educators collaborated with the ward nurse clinicians to organise lectures, hands-on practice sessions and competency assessments to equip our staff nurses for these advanced tasks.

The nurses' competency booklets were revised to include the advanced nursing skills assessment and its renewal period.

#### Learning to Care for the Aged

To create an awareness on care for the aging population in Singapore, our Nursing Division conducted mini gerontology online workshops for our nurses.

A total of eleven geriatric-related topics were presented monthly by nurses trained in specialties like neurology, gerontology and palliative care. This encouraged peer sharing and learning among them.





#### Fall Risk Intervention

In our continuous effort on fall prevention, the Nursing Fall Prevention committee had created a video on common fall scenarios in the ward areas for nurses in training.

# Supporting New Mothers

To reach out to new mothers via the electronic platform, Parentcraft classes and maternity virtual tours are now available.

New mothers could review topics at their own timing and or revisit topic again to help them along for their motherhood role.



#### **Nurturing Leaders**

For senior staff nurse to assume the supervisory role of a Nurse Manager or Clinician, a trial and evaluation opportunity was put in place. We utilised WSQ (Workforce Skills Quality) framework for performance management such as orientation, training, feedback and appraisal to allow high potential senior staff nurses to participate in actual supervisory work activities.

Since implementation, we could identify our second line of new managers / clinicians. Such a career development path provides nurses an ongoing mechanism to enhance their skills and knowledge that can lead to promotions to new or different positions.

### Our Year in Mission

#### Pioneering Nursing and Contributing to Healthcare in Singapore



In 2021, the Catholic Church in Singapore had a year-long celebration to commemorate 200 years. The Church grew from just being an outpost of the Roman Catholic Church, to become part of the local community and its nation-building journey. Our Catholic missionaries pioneered nursing in Singapore and helped to build the nation's healthcare service.

1 August 1885 officially marks the presence of nursing in Singapore, when the Infant Jesus (IJ) Sisters first answered the call to service. The IJs were followed by others including our FMDM Sisters, the first batch of fully trained nurses to arrive in Singapore. The FMDM Congregation went on to fund-raise, build and found Mount Alvernia Hospital.

#### Catholic200SG celebrations



As part of the celebrations, the FMDM Sisters and Mount Alvernia Hospital were featured in various media such as the commemorative book "From Outpost to Church, Singapore's Catholic Journey 1821 – 2021".

Mount Alvernia Hospital was also part of the Catholic200SG Festival on 8 Dec 2021. The exhibition showcased aspects of our social mission work and culture of care for our community, through our healthcare services, clinical pastoral care as well as medical-dental outreach programmes.

Our CEO, Dr James Lam, also presented on the theme 'Serving All with Love in Catholic Healthcare'. Besides highlighting Mount Alvernia Hospital's past contributions and upcoming projects, he shared how Catholic healthcare attends to physical, psychological and spiritual needs, and its implications in the pandemic. He also emphasised how our healthcare role is a unique opportunity to continue the healing ministry of Jesus Christ.

#### Clinical Pastoral Care (CPC) Support for COVID-19 patients

When the hospital admitted patients with COVID-19, CPC counsellors were unable to provide the usual face-to-face visits and support. CPC quickly looked into using telecounselling as we recognised the high anxiety possibly faced by these isolated patients.


A mobile phone line was dedicated to specific care for our patients with COVID. Each new admission would receive a welcome call, assuring them of our support during their stay, prayers and any assistance they might need.

For example, we provided some patients with care packs filled with basic necessities that they wanted and activity packs for paediatric patients. We also helped top up phone cards for foreign workers who needed to keep in touch with family back home. When patients updated us with good news that they could be discharged, we celebrated with them over the phone.

#### **Dedicated CPC Support for Staff**

Healthcare workers face unprecedented challenges during the pandemic, and our colleagues may require extra support to continue serving our patients with compassion, respect and dignity. CPC stepped up its support for staff by initiating an on-line booking system for sessions with CPC counsellors, where they could receive spiritual or emotional support. On Wednesdays, Friar William, OFM availed himself for the Sacrament of Reconciliation for Catholic colleagues.

#### Mission Engagement Activities for Staff



A total of 8 mission engagement sessions were conducted for staff in February and April, and another 2 online sessions in September. Staff welcomed these sessions that provided inputs for personal reflection, mutual dialogue and personal sharing.

To commemorate the Feast of the Stigmata of St Francis of Assisi, Friar Derrick Yap, OFM was invited to provide an online sharing for our annual reflection for staff on 17 September 2021. This year's reflection drew upon the wisdom of Pope Francis' encyclical 'Fratelli Tutti', the spirit of brotherhood and love that transcends all boundaries. It gave staff a unique opportunity to reflect on our Franciscan heritage as an FMDM family in our mission to care for the sick.

The sharings provided a testament that the vision of the hospital is continuing and served as timely reminder for all to pause and reflect amidst our work during a Covid-19 fatigue phase.

#### Fostering Community Spirit



Staff from all over the hospital came together again to express their Christmas cheer through a collection of video greetings. They showed off fantastic bonding and teamwork, in working to create the virtual Christmas meet-up comprising live interviews. The combined participation from everyone using MS Teams and YouTube Live was encouraging. Participants actively connected with each other and emanated life-giving energy and appreciation for each other through the live chats.

#### Becoming a Catholyst for Care

Our annual Joint Mission Formation Board Retreat with the ministries of Mount Miriam Cancer Hospital and Assisi Hospice was held in September 2021, with this year's theme being 'Becoming a Catholyst for Care'. Participants identified with Sr Jane Bertelsen, Congregational Leader FMDM's sharing on the 8 points of Franciscan Spirituality. As part of the retreat, they also took part in an Appreciative Inquiry exercise, where members across organisations interviewed each other and gained a better understanding of our diversity and shared commonalities.
