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Championing Care for Persons With Intellectual Disabilities: A Collaborative Approach

Mount Alvernia Hospital participated in the recent IDHealth Health Fair to offer Persons With Intellectual Disabilities (PWIDs) and their caregivers a much-needed health screening.

Healthcare professionals and volunteers came together to help individuals with intellectual disabilities and their caregivers at the IDHealth Health Fair, an event organised by IDHealth, an integrated healthcare team started by Happee Hearts Movement, a charity dedicated to serving adult PWIDs and their caregivers.

Held on 19 August 2023 at the Lee Kong Chian Gardens School - Singapore's first permanent school for intellectually-disabled children - the event made participants more aware about the healthcare needs of PWIDs and their caregivers and allow volunteers and healthcare partners a chance to meet PWIDs and understand their needs better in a guided setting.

Most importantly, health screenings and education were made available to families of PWIDs and their caregivers who may not otherwise have had this opportunity, by various volunteer healthcare teams consisting of doctors, dentists, dermatologists, dieticians, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and podiatrists who set up stations at the event.

The Mount Alvernia Hospital (MAH) Outreach Team was also present at the event to introduce attendees to the services and subsidies offered to PWIDs at the Mount Alvernia Outreach Medical and Dental

Complimentary Pre-Event Health Screenings

Prior to the event, the MAH Outreach Team offered complimentary health checks to PWIDs aged 21 and above from three partner organisations - SUNDAC, MINDS Youth Group, and Christian Outreach to the Handicapped (COH) - as well as one caregiver per PWID. All three partners are social service agencies dedicated to serving individuals with disabilities. These health screening sessions were held either at the Mount Alvernia Outreach Medical Clinic (MAOMC) or at the partner's own premises.

87 PWIDs and caregivers took part in this exercise which included a basic health screening and blood tests covering chronic illnesses such as high

blood pressure, cholesterol, diabetes, and to COH client Harpal. "Having the COH obesity. Sharing the motivation behind organising the IDHealth Health Fair, Dr Chen explained that she had always believed in the power of collaboration. "When likeminded individuals and organisations come together, we can tap on one another's strengths and support each other's limitations," she said. "This allows our impact and reach to go way beyond what an individual or single organisation can do."

"The MAH Outreach Team complements IDHealth very well in their provision of health screenings, acute and chronic care of less complex patients and

dental services," she added. "We are able to discharge or co-manage some of our stable patients with them, and take on more complex patients whilst being assured that they are all well cared for." \square
